Mr Kerry has been teaching KS2 how to bowl over-arm with a cricket ball worn round the wrist which saves a lot of chasing around!




OFF EXPLORING

WEIGHING IN




These are models of canopic jars. The Egyptians used them to store a dead body's stomach, intestines, lungs, and liver. They believed they would be needed in the afterlife.




Well done Edward for making this fantastic shaduf. The shaduf was used in ancient Egypt to lift water from one

More KS I doubling and halving using different materials. The children really enjoyed making the playdough in school and it looks like just as much fun was had at home!




REVOLTING RECIPES



The lady in the picture is my French penfriend, Chantal Fourtage who I started writing to when we were 13 years old. We exchanged letters and visits for five years during which time Chantal fell in love with my brother and they married in Bordeaux Castle.

Chantal's parents and grandparents were members of the French Resistance in World War 2. The Resistance played a vital part in helping the Allies, especially leading up to D-Day in June 1944. They supplied the Allies with intelligence reports as well as doing a huge amount of work to disrupt the German supply and communication lines in France. When Chantal's mother was just 16 years old, she would cross enemy lines on her bike hiding vital information in her underwear! She used to help British pilots by dyeing their hair and making them identity cards so that they could cross enemy lines and get back to England. Her grandfather hid important documents in his wooden leg! They did many incredible and brave things to help the Allies win the war. Although they were very young, my friend's parents were experts in explosives and led teams of Resistance fighters to capture German troops and set traps. They blocked roads, blew up bridges and at great risk to themselves, helped the Allied forces.

Sadly, the German SS captured Chantal's parents and her father was sent to one of the terrible concentration camps in Germany. Her mother escaped and hid in the woods, surviving on what she could find and sleeping rough. Chantal's father was one of the men liberated by the Allies when they opened the concentration camps at the end of the war. What an incredibly brave family! We should all be very thankful for the part the Resistance fighters played in the war.




Chantal's parents received many medals for their bravery and she is very proud of them. She was the mascot of the concentration camp survivors who met once a year in May to celebrate the liberation of their camp. **Mrs Morgan**

INDOORS CAMP OUT FOR VE DAY!




